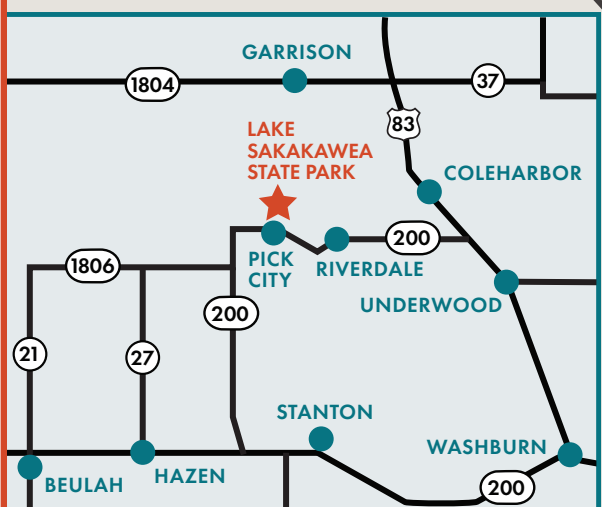

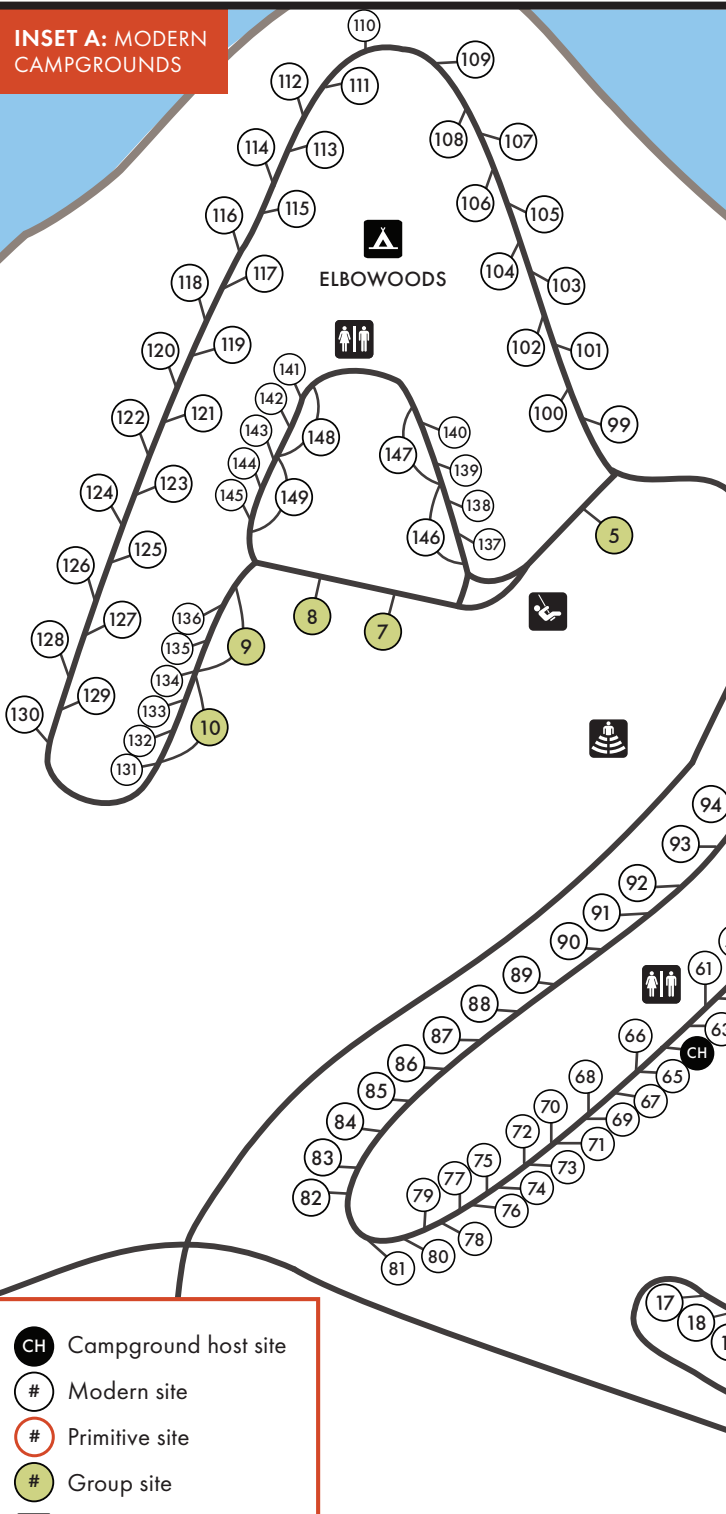

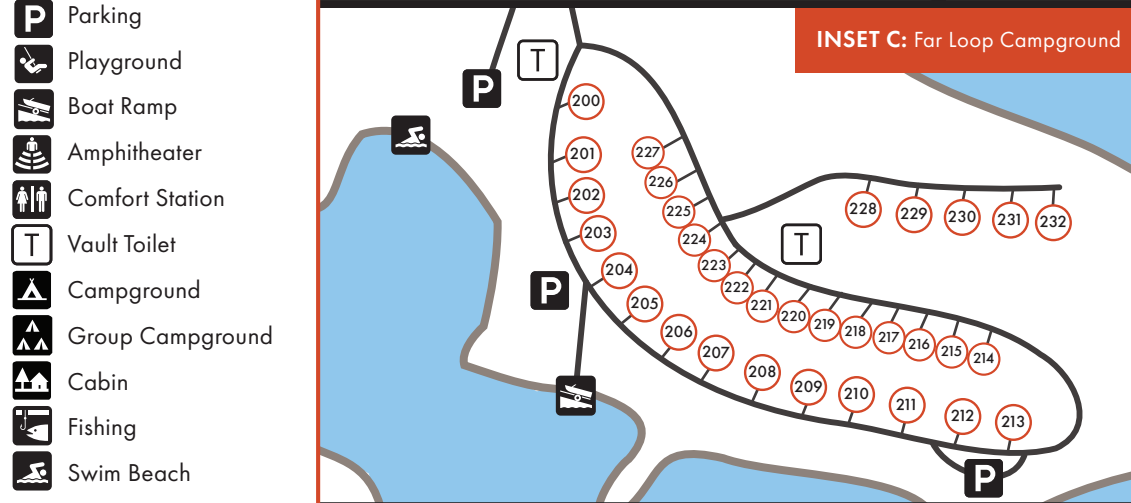
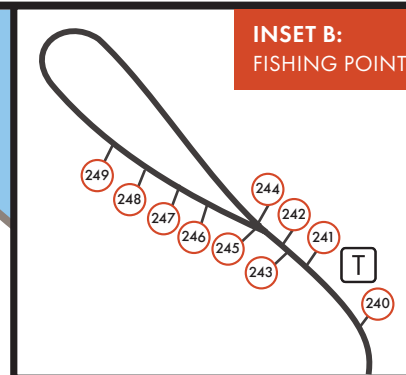

PARK HOURS

The park is open daily from 7 a.m. to 10 p.m. for use year-round.



CAMPGROUND QUIET HOURS

Quiet hours are between 10 p.m. – 7 a.m. year-round. Generator usage is allowed from 8 a.m. – 8 p.m.



FIREWOOD

To help prevent the spread of invasive species, we ask that visitors do not bring or use out-of-state firewood. Collecting firewood in the park is prohibited. Firewood is available for purchase at the Visitor Center and campground host site.



PETS ON LEASHES

Pets are welcome but must stay on a leash while in the state park.



EMERGENCY INFO

In an emergency dial 911. Find fire danger ratings and restrictions at ndresponse.gov.

VISITOR TIPS

- Please follow speed limits. Keep an eye out for wild animals and respect their habitat by remaining a safe distance.
- Visitors are prohibited from collecting and removing any natural items or artifacts from the park.
- **Camping:** check-in is at 4 p.m., checkout is at 3 p.m.
- **Overnight rentals:** check-in is 4 p.m., check-out is at noon

MUST SEE & DO

- Check out the swim beach located on the east side of the park. The beach is located in a protected cove of Lake Sakakawea, which makes for great swimming for the entire family!
- Cool off with some ice cream from the marina store and find unique gifts and souvenirs. The store is open Memorial Day to Labor Day.
- The North Country Trail is one of this park's highlights. Beginning in Vermont, the trail crosses eight states before ending at the western terminus of Lake Sakakawea State Park. The trail is the longest continuous hiking trail (4,600 miles) in the U.S. Access the North Country Trail near the Visitor Center, where a large sign rises from the hill prairie with a backdrop of the lake.

MORE TO EXPLORE

- Located on the south shore of the third-largest man-made reservoir in the nation lies Lake Sakakawea State Park. The park is surrounded by miles of lakeshore, providing stunning views. Sail boaters and windsurfers can take advantage of North Dakota's fabled wind on this 368,000-acre lake.
- A popular activity in the fall is shore fishing for Chinook salmon. Bring your boat and cast off from either of the two boat ramps and stop by the full-service marina for bait and fuel.
- Play at one of the playgrounds located in the park, or grab some friends for a round of horseshoes or a game of sand volleyball.

VISITING IN WINTER

- The world-class fishing doesn't stop in the winter. Grab your rod and try your luck at catching northern pike, sauger, walleye and smallmouth bass.
- Strap on some snowshoes and explore the lake or some of the less traversed areas of the park.
- A variety of wildlife species live within the rolling prairie and wooded draws of the park. Keep an eye out for white-tailed deer, pheasants, raccoons, jackrabbits, coyotes or fox.
